Textbook: Politics in States and Communities
(13th Edition, 2009), by Dye and MacManus

Course Objective: This course provides an overview of the conflicts in states and communities and the structures and processes designed to manage conflict. It is designed to teach students to be aware of public conflicts in their own communities and to encourage them to be involved in the conflict resolution process. The course begins by identifying the sources and nature of conflict in society and how conflict is carried on. Students will examine formal government structures and conduct case studies of current public conflicts at various stages in the resolution process.

Grading: Grades will be based on four written examinations, four in-class assignments, class participation and one applied learning assignment. Each exam will be worth 25 points, and each in-class assignment will be worth 10 points. Class participation will be worth 25 points and the applied learning assignment will be worth 35 points. Note: Exams, including the final exam, are not cumulative, although students will naturally be expected to apply concepts learned early in the course to topics explored later in the course.

Grades will be assigned as follows:
